



Opening Keynote Address: "The U.S. Catholic Church—Laudato Si', Creation Care, and the Climate Crisis" Most Rev. Robert W. McElroy, PhD

Bishop of San Diego
The Most Rev. Robert W. McElroy was named bishop of San Diego by Pope Francis in 2015, Prior to this, he was appointed auxiliary bishop of San Francisco by Pope Benedict XVI in 2010. Bishop McElroy holds a PhD in political science from Stanford University, has authored two books (The Search for an American Public Theology and Morality and American Foreign Policy) and frequently writes for the Jesuit publication America Magazine.



Opening Keynote Address: "The U.S. Catholic Church—Laudato Si', Creation Care, and the Climate Crisis" Meghan Goodwin, MA

ssociate Director of Government Relations, U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops Meghan Goodwin serves as the main point of contact between the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) and the U.S. Congress on issues relating to foreign policy, domestic antipoverty legislation and environmental policy. She was previously a policy advisor to the USCCB on issues of mental health, health care, economic and community development, trade, affordable housing and homelessness, immigration, education and poverty. Goodwin earned bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Virginia



Plenary Address 1: Spirituality and Conversion

Erin Lothes Biviano, PhD

ssociate Professor of Theology, College of Saint Elizabeth Erin Lothes Biviano is a leading Catholic environmental theologian. She has written two books (Inspired Sustainability: Planting Seeds for Action and The Paradox of Christian Sacrifice: The Loss of Self, the Gift of Self) and has published numerous articles, including "Catholic Moral Traditions and Energy Ethics for the Twenty-First Century," She is a former Earth Institute Fellow at Columbia University, and holds a PhD in systematic theology from Fordham University.



Plenary Address 2: What is Happening to our Common Home?

Director of the Nebraska State Climate Office and State Climatologist Martha D. Shulski is associate professor of applied climate science in the School of Natural Resources at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, director of the Nebraska State Climate Office and state climatologist. Her research interests are in the areas of climate variability and change and climate impacts, and she has ntributed to dozens of peer-reviewed scholarly journal articles. Shulski holds a PhD in soil, science and climatology from the University of Minnesota. She is a parishioner at St. Michael's Catholic parish in Lincoln, Nebraska.

Coordinator of the Sector on Ecology and Creation - Vatican Dicastery

The Rev. Joshtrom Isaac Kureethadam serves as coordinator of the Sector on Ecology and Creation in the Vatican's Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development. Prior to this work, he was chair of philosophy of science and director of the Institute of Social and Political Sciences at Salesian University in Rome. His most recent books include The Ten Green Commandments of Laudato Si¹, The Philosophical Roots of the Ecological Crisis: Descartes and the Modern Worldview and Creation in Crisis: Science, Ethics and Theology, Fr. Kureethadam holds a PhD from the Gregorian University in Rome.



Plenary Address 3: Love in Action Rev. Kenneth R. Himes, OFM, PhD

Professor of Theology, Boston College

The Rev. Kenneth R. Himes is a leading Catholic ethicist and moral theologian. He has published multiple books, including Christianity and the Political Order: Conflict, Cooptation, and Cooperation, edited Modern Catholic Social Teaching: Commentaries and Interpretations and authored dozens of articles and book chapters. He also serves on the editorial board of the Journal of Catholic Social Thought and is past president of the Catholic Theological Society of America. Fr. Himes holds a PhD in Religion and Public Policy from Duke University.



Plenary Address 4: Environmental and Climate Justice

Sacoby Wilson, PhD Associate Professor of Applied Environmental Health (MIAFH)

University of Maryland-College Park

Sacoby Wilson is an environmental health scientist focused on community-university partnerships on environmental health and justice issues. For the past two years, he has been building a program on community engagement, environmental justice and health to engage impacted commun advocacy groups and policymakers in Maryland and the Washington, D.C., region on environmental justice issues and environmental health disparities. Wilson has been published in numerous academic journals, including Social Science & Medicine, Environmental Research and Environmental Science and Policy. He holds a PhD in Environmental Health Sciences and Engineering from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.


Prioress of the Adrian Dominican Sisters



Overarching Challenges

- Care for Creation is not a top priority within the US Catholic Church
- Climate Change can be viewed as a political, not moral issue
- So many Catholic institutions and individuals are doing great work to care for creation and each other, yet we do not yet share information, coordinate or collaborate well enough



Overarching Themes

Our thoughts, prayers, words, and deeds in seeking climate solutions, must arise first from the Holy Spirit, within and among us, in accordance with the Greatest Commandment to love God and thy neighbor as thyself.



The Greatest Commandment

"Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?"

Jesus said to him, "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment.

The second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself.

The whole law and the prophets depend on these two commandments."

- Jesus, in Matthew 22: 37-40



Overarching Themes

- Share information: clearinghouses, networks
- Coordinate and Collaborate
- Use existing best practices, organizations to lift the mission, and create new entities where appropriate
- Integrate LS into existing ministries
- Seek Funding it means intentionality of purpose
- Build relationships with Church leaders on these issues



Overarching Solution: Faith Transcends Partisanship

"At its core, global climate change is not about economic theory or political platforms, nor about partisan advantage or interest group pressures. It is about the future of God's creation and the one human family." *USCCB*, 2001

"As individuals, as institutions, as a people we need **a change of heart** to preserve and protect the planet for our children and for generations yet unborn." *USCCB*, 1991



Advocacy

- Top advocacy priorities: 1) Reduce global greenhouse gas emissions; and 2) Transition to renewables/reduce fossil fuel use
- Build relationships with bishops and pastors
- Explore creation of a Catholic Climate Advocacy organization like Catholic Education Partners
- Galvanize the Catholic spirit to act on climate, through "Moments"



Advocacy

Adult Faith Formation

- Build a wholistic program that advances the 4 stages of Evangelization: pre-event, conversion, becoming a disciple, being a disciple in mission
- Integrate LS throughout every Adult Faith Formation opportunity including liturgy, sacramental preparation, bible study, community outreach
- Catalog, critique and disseminate current resources, including climate/EJ stories



Energy Management

- Start small: community garden, lights, sealing windows and doors
- Find ways to "share savings" across the community or between wealthy and poor parishes
- Form an internship/volunteer program esp. for engineering, env studies majors from Catholic universities, working with Catholic schools and institutions
- Connect with and train Creation Care Teams

Liturgy

- Sunday Mass is often the only time parishioners encounter God and Church in community and with intentionality
- Look anew at the existing liturgy to integrate care for creation themes E.g., Homily helps, missal, prayers, symbols, plants
- Create a clearinghouse of resources
- Create a network of liturgists willing to take on this vocation



School Education

- Duplicate best initiatives and practices across the US Catholic school community
 - Salpointe High School
 - Diocese of Toledo
 - National Catholic Education Association's (NCEA) new STREAM initiative (Science, Technology, **Religion**, Engineering, **Arts**, Math)
- Seek funding from local Catholic foundations to help schools do this work
- Collaborate with local universities and community groups to do immersion programs.



Several dioceses are emphasizing CCTs and providing resources and assistance.




Creation Care Teams in Parishes, Schools, and Religious Communities

What is Needed?

- Engaging/connecting with youth, sharing the stories of the successes of women religious, more pastors preaching on eco-spirituality and *Laudato Si'*.
- Resources that move the church to a much deeper spiritual connection with creation.
- Establishing networks between CCTs (inter and intra diocesan networking)
- Expand CCT program in both quantity (numbers) and expand work to work with impacted communities and advocacy.




